



The value of each Scholarship is \$15,000 per annum for the duration of the individual's degree.

#### Eligibility

##### Applicants must:

- Be of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent.
- Identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.
- Be accepted as such by the community in which they live or have lived.
- Provide written confirmation of their Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander heritage.
- Be able to demonstrate financial hardship or need.
- Be 16 years or older at the time they commence their studies.
- Have written confirmation of enrolment in an undergraduate degree at a NSW university.
- Have successfully completed your first year of full time equivalent undergraduate study and be commencing your second year of full time equivalent undergraduate study on site at a NSW university.

#### Financial value and details:

Funds may be used for a range of purposes including (but not limited to): textbooks, IT needs, transport, accommodation, living expenses or HECS fees.
